Work on "S" Is Nearing Completion

The senior class of the high school nearly completed the mammoth "S" on Tenderfoot Saturday in an all day "rocking bee." At eight o'clock in the morning, the twelfth year students started filling the frame work with rock and by three that afternoon the letter was complete. Within a short time a crew of students will whitewash the letter and it will be ready to formally dedicate and give to the school.

One of the largest letters of its kind in the state, and by far the biggest high school letter in the state, the "S" measures over eighty feet in height by fifty in width. The strip itself is fifteen feet wide.

Over three thousand feet of surface will need be whatewashed to make the letter visible while over 450,000 pounds of rock and stone have been used in filling in the structure. Nearly the entire senior class assisted by Misses Scott and Mitchell, and Mr. King, Mr. Sole and Mr. Barrett worked on the structure Saturday.

The entire cost of the affair is being borne by the class of '32 after which the seniors of this year will turn the letter over to the school with the request that succeeding senior classes take over the task of requiring the freshmen each year to white wash the huge monument just before the first football game of the year.

A group of seniors met in the principal's office this evening to make final plans for finishing the structure during spring vacation. The letter which will be visible for miles on completion will serve as an easy method of identifying the city both by air or motor travelers.
